




#### **MALE - OUTCOMES**




#### **FEMALE - OUTCOMES**




#### **COMBINED SERVICE USERS OUTCOMES**




# MALE EMPLOYMENT AFTER SERVICE INVOLVEMENT




### FEMALE EMPLOYMENT AFTER SERVICE




\*\*Those marked as being in temporary accommodation have completed the program and are abstinent.

They have been housed in temporary homeless accommodation which is not the Acres to aid their continued recovery whilst waiting on a secure tenancy.


#### OCCUPANCY 2011-2020
